Harcourt v Avoca

Avoca make the trip to Harcourt on Saturday to meet the undefeated Lions who are taking all before them and it will be a tough task for the Bulldogs to win their fifth game of the season and keep their finals hopes alive.

The Bulldogs last game was a disappointing loss to Natte-Bealiba after a third quarter lapse was costly and will need a four-quarter effort against the Lions.

Avoca's defence has allowed one hundred and two goals through in their nine games, and they will have a tough challenge against the likes of Zac Denahy with thirty-six goals and Benny Leech with thirty-three goals.

The Lions have many other avenues to goal, and it could be a very hard day at the office for the Bulldogs defenders.

Navarre v Talbot

Talbot travel to Navarre in what could be the game of the round as both teams appear to be evenly placed on the ladder.

Navarre and Talbot have played eleven games since 2011 with the Grasshoppers winning eleven times and the Hawks have only won twice.

Although two of Talbot's victories over the Grasshoppers have been at Navarre so they will have no fear of the away venue.

The break for the covid lockdown will allow both teams to enter the game fully fit and rested and they will both be looking forward to getting back on the park.

Talbot are higher up the ladder and will be favoured to win their third ever game against the Grasshoppers on Saturday.

Dunolly v Maldon

It has been a very tough season for the winless Eagles, and it doesn't look likely to improve in a hurry when they host Maldon at Deledio Park on Saturday.

The Eagles sit at the bottom of the ladder while Maldon sit comfortably in fourth place after a massive seventy-five-point victory over fifth place Lexton in their last encounter.

The Bombers are also unveiling recruit and former Bomber Julian Lockwood who returns to Maldon this season after time away in the Northern Territory, where he played top level football with Nightcliff and the Northern Territory Thunder.
